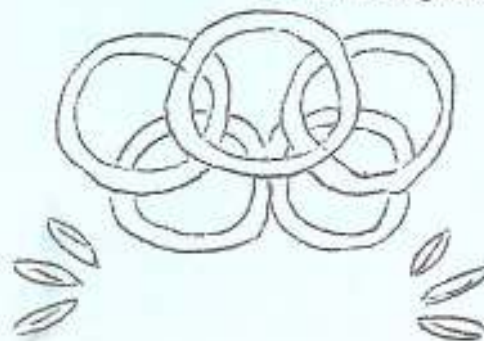

David Mogul started their runs... 2mph, tie: 35 miles an hour - tie: 28 miles an hour - tie: 30 miles an hour - tie: shortened rope at 30 miles an hour - tie. Then - one slip one buoy missed, and David Mogul as the winner - Marc Rubin, second.

The next day the trick event was held with Aunt Betty watching from the boat. Each competitor had his carefully planned and practiced tricks, and took his place knowing that one slip meant elimination. Marc Strauchberg made his first run, good. His second, the end of the run with 95 points. David Mogul took his place for the first run. Backward start, good backward run, good 180 degree turn - disaster strikes, ending the first run. A good second run puts him back in the running with 85 points. Marc Kaplan makes his run with a fall, and a second run for 60 points. Marc Rubin lines up a backward start, good backward run, now the 100 yard and a fall. A good second run gives him 137 points and a first place. In the final event David Mogul placed first in the single ski slalom.

In the Junior division, boys ten and under, neighbors competed. Stephen Lerner emerged as all events champion with 100 points, but only after a stiff battle with Glenn Sommer, 70 points, and next door friend Jack Silbermann with 60 points. Steve won the two ski event, Glenn Sommer second and Jack Silbermann third, and Eric Bromberg fourth.

Steve Lerner goes first in the trick event with a good first run, a deep water start on the second run and a fall on the single run. Good, but will it be good enough? Glenn Sommer tries. A fall on the first run, and a fall on the second. Ted Abrams has a good run, but behind Steve. Eric Bromberg ties with Ted. Then... Jack Silbermann makes one good run, then another... and the trick event has a surprise champion!

The Intermediate II division for boys 13 and 14 was almost conceded from the outset with one of the ski teams better skiers, Gary Leeds being the odds on favorite.
