*** CHICKAWAH FLOAT TAKES 1ST
IN OLD HOME DAYS PARADE***

Harrison: Tom Laskawy

On July 12 through 14, the town of Harrison held the annual Old Home Days festival. Included in the festivities was a carnival and a parade. Many business and non profit organizations and camps in the area entered floats, and Chickawah, for the first time, was among them.

The theme of the parade was 1984. For our float, Paul Ehlers created a composite animal to represent "Maine Animal of the 21st Century.. 1984-2084". Paul designed a sketch of the float and with Steve Clark's help, turned it into reality with chicken wire and paper mache.

Work began about a week and a half before the parade. The construction was done in many steps. First a wooden frame was put together. Then the chickenwire was attached, which Paul and Steve shaped to resemble the creature. In this stage, Steve found his calling. A chicken wire sculptor par excellence! Atop the chicken-wire several layers of paper mache were applied, which, when hardened, were sealed with latex. The final step was the painting, and the fantastic animal came alive under Paul's brush with Brad Solmsen filling in basic color. Many campers assisted on each step of the project. They included Brad Solmsen, Charles Wingerter, Tom Laskawy, Matt Adelson, Todd Joison, Jordan Weinberg, Jeff Greilsheimer, Adam Pasternack, Jesse Greene and many others.

Finally, on Saturday, July 14, our float, dubbed Aggravane (for origin of the name ask Steve Clark) was loaded on to the pick-up where with one Bob-Cat paw resting on top of the cab, the finishing touches were added. In the line-up (28 in a field of 73) Aggravane was joined by Tom Laskawy and David Friedman holding the Chickawah banner, Paul Ehlers driving his creation, with Sean McManus at his side, and Steve Clark
